

PUTTING THE LAND ON THE MAP

Dr Curnow has brought together a wide range of works by New Zealand artists who explore a variety of approaches to mapping in the production of their work.

"Putting the Land on the Map" contains three sections: 19th Century Artists, Contemporary Artists and a section entitled Mapping Pouerua, which looks at the contrasting Maori and Pakeha approaches to mapping the land.

Aspects of map production

Display panels will inform about the many processes involved in map making. A theodolite, an instrument used for measuring horizontal and vertical angles, is installed in the resource area and available for inspection.

Thanks to the courtesy of the Department of Survey and Land Information you will be able to watch how maps are shaded to make them look three dimensional. The contour shading is done by Tony Fraser, a professional cartographer who instead of working in his office in Heaphy House will work in the gallery.
