Kusama's work, idiosyncratic and consistently original, has positioned her as one of the most acclaimed and respected contemporary artists working today. A radical and epoch-defining figure in the New York art world of the 1960s, Yayoi Kusama vied with Andy Warhol for the position of the most publicised artist of the era. Kusama became a mover and shaker in American counter-culture, organising public happenings as well as making influential work in a period when significant changes and innovations were taking place in art. In 1973 Kusama returned to Japan, where she continues to play a prominent role in the international art-world. Her work has been highly influential to a new generation of artists and designers. Yayoi Kusama: Mirrored Years presents seminal works from the 1960s and 1970s alongside more recent work. Kusama is renowned for her lifelong interest in visual perception and sensory experiences, her fixation with repetitive patterns and forms, her iconic use of dots and her dizzving installations.

Mixing Op Art, Pop Art and sculptural practice, her all-enveloping roominstallations, mirrored to infinity, are hallucinatory, surreal, and utterly unlike anything else you will experience in the world of art. During the exhibition a new documentary *Near Equal vol. 5, Yayoi Kusama: I adore myself* will be screening in the new Denis and Verna Adam auditorium.



Parihaka artist Ngaahina Hohaia (Ngãti Moeahu, Ngãti Haupoto) will launch the new Roderick and Gillian Deane Gallery dedicated to Mãori and Pacific art. Two works using over five hundred embroidered poi reflect upon interactions between the people of Parihaka and the colonial forces in the late 19th century. In particular, Hohaia honours Parihaka's political and spiritual leaders, Te Whiti o Rongomai and Tohu Kãkahi, and their message of passive resistance. One of Hohaia's poi installation pieces *Patuki manawa* has recently been on display in Fibra Spirare, an exhibition at Rydals Museum in Sweden showcasing five contemporary New Zealand textile artists.

A gallery-spanning motorway bypass constructed entirely from cane basketwork will launch the new Michael Hirschfeld Gallery. Wellington artist Regan Gentry has created a new installation for City Gallery Wellington. Viewers will share the gallery with a vast 12m long bridge form, and be able to move between its 4m high supporting columns. Regan's past work has engaged with materials including car tyres, No. 8 wire, gorsewood, manila twine, pumice and toe toe. Make Way recalls a piece of colossal kitsch architecture, or 1970s handcraft grown unruly. The work responds to contemporary discussions about ecological harm, local communities and urban planning, and processes of making and building.

Painter Gerda Leenards will create a panoramic frieze scene in the Gallery, taking the viewer on an imagined journey along the Yulong and Li Rivers. A sequence depicting rural China's mountainous landscape as experienced from the water, *Following the Blue Ribbon* is the result of the artist's recent trip to the Guilin province. The progression of connected canvas panels suggest time gone by – or time as it goes. Within each frame of these time-release images we see a section of the horizon, and its reflection often far more distinctly. Coolly contemplative, this series expands and continues Leenards' explorations of light, atmosphere and water.

Defining himself as a 'fundamental Modernist'. Wellington architect Bill Toomath has played a pioneering role in the propagation of Modernism in the local context. This exhibition concentrates on three key projects - the plans for a National Museum of Art on the waterfront (1949 thesis project). Toomath House (1950), and St Jerome's study (2007) - to look at his expression of 'continuous space'. City Gallery Wellington has worked closely with Bill Toomath, and with Sam Kebbell (Kebbell Daish Architects) to put together an exhibition which pays tribute to an extraordinary figure from the architecture community, and attempts to explore some of the paradoxes and contradictions within a conventional understanding of Modernist architecture.
