1990 is the 150th Anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi, which is the Founding Charter for Aotearoa. Through the Treaty, Maori rights are confirmed and the place of Pakeha defined.

Haeata Maori Women's Art Collective, in partnership with Project Waitangi and Wellington City Art Gallery, have commissioned and negotiated an exhibition project focused upon the Treaty of Waitangi, the issues surrounding the document and their effect on Aotearoa since 1840.

The project comprises an exhibition, a forum programme and a resource section.

EXHIBITION

A number of artists were invited to discuss the kaupapa of this project to developing a work or group of works for siting in the Wellington City Art Gallery.

We were seeking both Maori and Pakeha artists whose intention and work would reflect the Treaty, its articles and the issues of ratification and implementation. The selection of Maori artists for this exhibition was made by Haeata, the Pakeha artists by Project Waitangi in association with W.C.A.G. From Pakeha artists we were interested in seeking Pakeha responses to the Treaty and not a colonisation of Maori styles.
